













# What can you spot on the beach?

<p><b>Boats</b></p> <p>The English Channel is the busiest shipping lane in the world!</p>	<p><b>Wind</b></p> <p>The UK is one of the best locations for wind power in the world and is a leader in offshore wind.</p>	<p><b>Waves</b></p> <p>Waves are most commonly caused by wind. If you like surfing in Brighton, winter is the best time!</p>	<p><b>Turbines</b></p> <p>Rampion Wind Farm has 116 turbines which are spread over a 72km<sup>2</sup> area.</p>
<p><b>Pier</b></p> <p>Brighton Palace pier opened in 1899 and is visited by over 4 million people every year.</p>	<p><b>Sand</b></p> <p>Sand can only be spotted at Brighton beach at low tide. The main rock around here is chalk which cannot be broken down into sand.</p>	<p><b>Mermaid's Purse</b></p> <p>Shark &amp; Ray egg cases ('mermaid's purses') are leathery, watertight shells containing an embryo and a yolk sac.</p>	<p><b>Stones</b></p> <p>Stones are moved manually from the beaches on the west of river Adur, to the east by lorry, from there the sea carries it down the coast to us!</p>
<p><b>Seaweed</b></p> <p>The seaweed you see could be part of the 'kelp forest' which is an important part of the Sussex coastline.</p>	<p><b>People</b></p> <p>Brighton is a very popular tourist destination, the city welcomes around 9.5 million visitors a year.</p>	<p><b>Seagulls</b></p> <p>The term 'seagull' is often used to describe the Herring Gull which is a common sight in Brighton.</p>	<p><b>Insects</b></p> <p>Very close to Brighton, at Shoreham Beach, in a 2018 survey, 248 species of insects were identified.</p>
